How we make a difference

The Veterinary Science Foundation supports the Faculty of Veterinary Science through a range of important initiatives including:

The University Veterinary Teaching Hospital, Sydney

The VSF has raised the funds to complete this project, however to keep this facility as a model of veterinary excellence, equipment is being constantly updated, an ongoing project of the Foundation.

The new University Teaching Hospital provides:

- a world class veterinary specialist referral centre
- an internationally-renowned teaching hospital for future veterinarians
- excellence in research to benefit the future health of pets
- the highest quality clinical medicine for the community's animals

The University Veterinary Teaching Hospital, Camden

The Faculty is already a world leader in equine medicine, equine exercise physiology and biochemistry, as well as in nutrition and disease management in production animals. The foundation's work will support the redevelopment of the University Veterinary Teaching Hospital on the Camden campus.

Wildlife Health and Conservation Centre

This newly constructed facility was opened in May 2007 in response to the growing concern by veterinary students and the community for Australia's native fauna. This Centre is unique in Australasia and only one of a few in the world it will:

- provide a clinic devoted to the treatment and rehabilitation of injured native animals and reptiles
 - train undergraduate and postgraduate veterinary students in wildlife medicine and conservation through the Faculty's Veterinary Conservation Biology unit
 - facilitate research enhancing understanding of our native fauna
 - assist in wildlife emergencies, such as bushfires and oil spills
- The centre has support from Taronga and Dubbo Zoos, Australian Museum, National Parks and Wildlife, the NSW Government.

What is the Veterinary Science Foundation?

Established in 1910, the University of Sydney's Faculty of Veterinary Science is Australia's oldest veterinary school and one that is internationally recognised.

Just as there have been huge leaps forward in human medical science in recent times, so too in veterinary science. University of Sydney veterinarians have been at the forefront in the treatment and care of small and large animals, advances in farm animal production, wildlife conservation, and exciting world-first research.

The Veterinary Science Foundation is dedicated to supporting animal health and welfare, the education of future veterinarians, and excellence in research. It supports the Faculty's vision of leadership and innovation, and ensures its aims for the future are realised.

Other Projects

Through the Veterinary Science Foundation, the Faculty has established a **Teaching Innovation Unit** to provide internationally competitive teaching programs focused on graduating the world's best veterinarians.

The Faculty is dedicated to safeguarding Australia's production animal industries. It has taken a leadership role in **Farm Animal Health, Production and Food Safety** through a new Farm Animal Health Team and, with the Foundation's help, is developing new undergraduate and postgraduate programs in epidemiology and pathology.

The Faculty is widely acknowledged as a leader in animal science research. It has internationally-recognised strengths in the fields of reproduction and genetics/genomics.

The challenge of the future

Perhaps our biggest challenge for the future is the need to be increasingly independent of government funding. For the Veterinary Science Foundation to continue to play its important role, it needs external support to attract and recruit those rare individuals who have the talent and drive to lead the global field in veterinary education, medicine and research.
